JUST PUSH PLAY...

2002 Melges 24 World Champion Andy Burdick knows what it takes to win. As one of several key individuals involved in the development and design of the Melges 24, he knows the ins and outs of this dynamic machine and a thing or two about preparation for the level of competition that awaits the fleet in Annapolis. Burdick reveals his top ten 'highly-recommended-most-commonly-requested' list of parts, products and accessories along with some tips and reminders that can help your team do well at the upcoming Worlds and 2010 Winter Series.

1. Melges 24 Sail Track End Stops

These are now a class rule. Make absolutely sure your mast and boom have these.

2. Backstay Batten

Over time these fatigue, crack or break. Be sure yours is in new condition.

3. Bow Sprit Seals

Every boat should have two of these. Double check to make sure that your seals are not cracked. These keep your boat dry.

4. McLube Hullkote

We have been using this on our boats and it has been very, very good. Perfect for your hull and deck brightwork.

5. Tapered Maffioli Spinnaker Sheets, Tack Line and Jib Sheets

These lines are really nice on your hands and run through the blocks clean. They last much longer than your standard tapered sheets. For the Worlds, I highly recommend these!

6. Rudder Pins

New bronze rudder pins are available for the Melges 24. Very cool.

7. Backstay

Check your backstay and be sure the UV has not deteriorated the integrity of the line. This should be replaced at least once a year.

8. Mesh Sheet Bags

Mesh sheet bags are always in stock and ready to ship direct to you. A good thing to have in your spare parts box as well.

9. Top and Bottom Furling Units, Carbo Blocks & Cunningham Blocks Available online at **melges.com**, these items are key for smooth sailing. Checking to make sure your hardware is in great shape, it's vital to performance.

10. Melges Kevlar Gear Bag

This is perfect for storing all of your race gear and sheets.

Quantum Leap into the fast seat

with Scott Nixon

Scott Nixon of Quantum Sails has been a long-time, strong supporter of the Melges 24 in the U.S.A. In particular, has been very involved in helping build the Southeast, and Northeast fleets.

He has sailed the Melges 24 for many years and just in the last ten months, the **USMCA** has taken notice of his winning performances. The 2008 North American Championship, 2009 Charleston Race Week and Sail Newport Regatta are among his recent prize titles. Now, along with co-owner Terry Hutchinson, they have their sights firmly focused on doing well at the forthcoming 2009 Melges 24 World Championship, on October 23-31.

Born and raised in Southern Virginia, Nixon grew up learning to sail Sunfish and

M24*USA: Throughout your career and life-long sailing endeavors, you have had the opportunity to sail many different kinds of boats. Tell us when it was exactly that you first took notice of the Melges 24 and why you thought it was a fleet you should to be involved with?

SN: Being in Annapolis for so long and already knowing how to sail, I saw professionals like Terry Hutchinson and Chris Larson racing Melges 24s. I really wanted to be a part of that. In 2000, I started working for Quantum Sails and witnessed customers talking, so excited about purchasing and sailing the Melges 24. So, I gave it a try by first sailing in the Sail Makers Challenge with Chris Larson. I sailed for years on an FJ going downwind at only 5-10 knots. Then, to sail on the Melges 24 at 20 FJs. He attended St. Mary's College then, took a job shortly after graduation with the College of Charleston as the coach of the Women's Sailing Team. Victory was sweet when he triumphed over his old alm mater at Nationals.

He fulfilled his destiny with a professional career in the sailing industry when he joined up with the Quantum Sails team. Nine years later, Scott is still very much on top of things in the Annapolis loft and over the top about the Melges 24.

knots was an incredible thrill. Everyone's heads were turned with the speed and performance that the Melges 24 put out. In order to keep up with everyone like Terry Hutchinson, I had to go get a Melges 24.

M24*USA: Over the last couple of years we've seen you interchange positions on the boat. You've either been a helmsman or a tactician. Do you have a preference and why?

SN: It has helped me to know and do both roles for the sake of experience. The helmsman position depends on whether I've got a good tactician or not. If I feel comfortable and know the tactician is good at what he does then I'm good with just driving the boat. However if I feel uncomfortable and am weary, I like to go for the tactician role because you are more involved in what is going on. So it varies depending on the circumstances.

M24*USA: For you, specifically what is the change in the mind set to go from a successful helmsman to knowledgeable tactician?

SN: The right crew. Which I have. This allows me to drive a lot. I love helming the Melges 24. The only thing with driving is you aren't aware of all the pieces to the puzzle like you are as tactician. As tactician, you can see and hear everything, however driving separates you from hearing and knowing all that is going on.

M24*USA: Do you have any trade secrets in the Melges 24 that you are willing to share right now?



SN: Not quite yet. I'll save those for after the 2009 Worlds Championship.

M24*USA: Looking at the fleet and how far you have come from sailing FJs to being a winning helmsman in the Melges 24, what advice would you provide amateur teams about things they should or shouldn't be doing?

SN: At some of the regattas, I see guys spending a great deal of time in the parking lot cleaning their boats, trying to make it look good. Instead of trying to make the boat look so good, they need to be concentrating on perfecting the things that can have a huge impact on the water. Things such as smoothing the tack sail and spinnaker sail. It's the little things that can get you further up in the results. They should be concerned about getting

their kite down fast enough and perfect. If you get the little things perfected, then you can sail and move forward in the fleet. The biggest thing I think is just trying to simplify how you sail; don't try to overdo it.

The competition is getting fierce though. The level and the game is really being pushed in the Melges 24. For example, the Italian teams like *Uka Uka* have taken this fleet to a new level.

M24*USA: So, the pressure is on for you, Terry and your crew for the upcoming Worlds...

SN: Yeah... (with a laugh). Terry and I got so tired of borrowing other people's boats. So, with the help of Quantum, we were able to buy a Melges 24, get a crew together and stay together. We've got Brian Janney on the bow,

who is awesome. There's George Peet as the trimmer and Amy Ironmonger as a floater. In Charleston, we brought in one of the best teams, featuring one of the best tacticians in the world — Chris Rast. He brought a whole new style to the crew. At the Sail Newport event, we had Charlie Ogletree. Sometimes we like to shake things up by trying and learning how to perfect our strategy in the effort to be the best. We have a great crew and that is what has allowed us to succeed thus far.

Scott, thanks again for speaking with M24*USA and most importantly know that the USMCA is pulling for you as one of the US Class' top contenders for the Worlds title. Best of luck!


